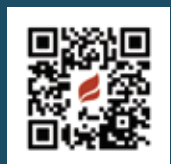

As we go to press, we are delighted that a new US Special Coordinator for Tibetan Issues has been named. Assistant Secretary Riley M. Barnes has been appointed—restoring a vital role that represents the US government’s continued, bipartisan commitment to the Tibetan peoples’ rights.

## NEW US SPECIAL COORDINATOR FOR TIBETAN ISSUES CELEBRATES LOSAR AT THE STATE DEPARTMENT

ICT warmly welcomes US Secretary of State Marco Rubio's appointment of Mr. Riley M. Barnes, the Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor, to serve as the US Special Coordinator for Tibetan Issues.

We thank Special Coordinator Barnes for hosting the State Department's annual celebration of Losar on February 17, 2026—continuing a long bipartisan tradition of celebrating Tibetan New Year at the State Department. The Losar celebration was co-planned by ICT and the Capital Area Tibetan Association.

ICT President Tencho Gyatso said she looks forward to partnering with Assistant Secretary Barnes and his staff and remarked, "I'm glad to see the new Special Coordinator is someone with a true interest in, and commitment to, Tibet."



Assistant Secretary Barnes previously visited Dharamsala to meet with Tibetan leaders in 2019 and 2025. ICT is grateful for his warm remarks to the Tibetan people, which connected Tibet to global peace and prosperity and US national security.

The Special Coordinator plays a vital role in coordinating US support for Tibet. Previous appointees established a legacy of advances for US Tibet policy. In his new role, ICT encourages Assistant Secretary Barnes to push for stronger, more consistent, and more public advocacy to revive the Sino-Tibetan dialogue process and ensure full implementation of the US government's foreign assistance to the Tibetan community.

### ICT IN DHARAMSALA

ICT Chairman Richard Gere, along with President Tencho Gyatso, Executive Director Ryan Fiorelli, and ICT Germany Executive Director Kai Mueller, visited Dharamsala, India to participate in the Special Meeting of Tibet Support Groups from over 30 countries, joining to honor His Holiness the Dalai Lama's 90th Birthday, and participate in the March 10 Tibetan National Uprising Day commemorations.

Their time in Dharamsala included a special visit to the Tibetan Children's Village (TCV) school, and an interactive session with the older students talking about personal engagement and connections to Tibet, as well as an overview of ICT, our membership and our work for Tibet.



## WELCOMING NEW BOARD MEMBERS

to our Board of Directors.*



### Tenzin Kalsang Gonta

Tenzin Kalsang Gonta (she/they) was an inaugural member of ICT's Tibetan Youth Leadership Program and is honored to come full circle by serving as a Board member for the organization. The child of Tibetan refugees, Tenzin is among the first generation of Tibetans born in the US.

Raised by a wise and loving community of elders, Tenzin is an active member of the Tibetan diaspora. They served in the Tibetan government-in-exile and held leadership positions with a wide range of Tibet support groups, each working to advance His Holiness the Dalai Lama's vision for the Tibetan people.

Tenzin currently works as an accountability professional in the public and nonprofit sectors. They have led teams of performance auditors at the state and local levels of

government to improve services for the most vulnerable. As a certified internal auditor, Tenzin has contributed to the profession as a peer reviewer with the Association of Local Government Auditors, board member for the Portland chapter of the Institute of Internal Auditors, and audit expert on the bond accountability committee for Portland Public Schools.

Prior to their career in government, Tenzin held positions in the nonprofit sector at organizations of local and national scope. They remain connected to community-based organizations as a volunteer, most recently as Board Treasurer for the Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization. In graduate school, Tenzin researched public-nonprofit partnerships as well as projects that developed nonprofit leaders of color.

Born and raised in the Pacific Northwest, Tenzin is grateful for the experiences they share with their child at Tibetan School each Sunday and in the wilderness each summer.



### Uzra Zeya

Former US Special Coordinator for Tibetan Issues Uzra Zeya has been a leader in the human rights community for most of her professional life. In April 2025, Zeya joined Human Rights First (HRF) as President and CEO. In this role, she leads HRF efforts to advance human rights for

all, defend democracy at home and abroad, uphold the rule of law, and protect vulnerable populations fleeing oppression.

As US Under Secretary of State for Civilian Security, Democracy, and Human Rights from July 2021 to January 2025, Zeya led global US diplomacy to advance human rights, strengthen rule of law, support refugees, elevate the fight against corruption, and combat transnational crime and human trafficking. Concurrently, she was US Special Coordinator for Tibetan issues, rallying

international partners to support Tibetans' human rights and preserve their unique identity.

As president and CEO of the Alliance for Peacebuilding, she led a non-partisan network of 150+ organizations working on peaceful conflict resolution in 180+ countries. Her distinguished diplomatic career included senior roles at US embassies in France and India, the Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor, and advising Secretaries of State Rice and Clinton. She also served in Syria, Egypt, Oman, and Jamaica, and speaks French, Arabic, and Spanish.

Zeya co-authored a 2021 Council on Foreign Relations report that shaped State Department modernization. She is on the University of Notre Dame Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies Board of Advisors. She was awarded the French Legion d'Honneur and the Cross of Commander of the Order of the Lithuanian Grand Duke Gediminas in recognition of her contributions to a more just and peaceful world.

# 17 POWERFUL TIBETAN PROJECTS

AWARDED GRANTS FROM ROWELL FUND AND SCHRUCKER FELLOWSHIP IN 2026

## The Rowell Fund

The Rowell Fund for Tibet's Advisory Board has awarded \$36,000 in grants in support of ten projects for 2026, marking an \$11,000 increase in funding from previous years. These projects aim to empower Tibetans and the preservation of Tibetan culture, strengthen community resilience, and safeguard Tibetan identity in the face of growing challenges.

The Rowell Fund Advisory Board approved 3 journalism grants in this cycle. At a time when Tibetan-language reporting and independent coverage of Tibet continue to face significant challenges—including recent disruptions to the Tibetan services of Radio Free Asia (RFA) and Voice of America (VOA)—supporting Tibetan journalists and storytellers remains critical.

Managed by ICT, the Fund honors the legacy of Galen and Barbara Rowell, lifelong supporters of Tibet who tragically passed away in a plane crash in 2002.

### Highlighting Some of This Year's Rowell Fund Recipients

#### Enhancing News Coverage Inside Tibet

Recipient: Pema Tso



In order to promote ideas of democracy, human rights, and freedom of expression, which are crucial for establishing a robust foundation for a democratic Tibetan society and preserving Tibet's unique identity, Tibet

Times was founded in 1996. It has remained a primary and trustworthy source of information due to its impartial and candid coverage of political developments and major news stories concerning Tibetan issues.

Prior to 2008, Tibet Times dispatched significant issues of our newspaper through agents in Nepal via Tibetan pilgrims. However, increased security measures and bans on transit movements from Tibet have diminished the newspaper's reach in the region. To combat this, Tibet Times continues to distribute every print copy of our newspaper to institutions and educational centers in China directly by post. Additionally, Tibet Times distributes newspapers free of charge to most Tibetan schools in India and Nepal.

This project aims to strengthen the flow of reliable information from inside Tibet by introducing a fair compensation system for news contributors. By providing meaningful financial incentives, it encourages more reporters to gather and share critical updates.

#### Empowering Women Through Stitching

Recipient: Tenzin Youdon



Tenzin Youdon is a Tibetan fashion designer, educator, and social entrepreneur based in India. She is the founder of Youdon Designs, dedicated to preserving traditional Tibetan dress while empowering women and youth.

This project by Youdon Designs aims to empower women in the Tibetan

and Himalayan communities through online training in tailoring and traditional dressmaking. The program includes scholarships, sustainable fashion practices, and small-scale entrepreneurship training. By preserving cultural heritage and providing marketable skills, the project empowers women with economic independence, and sustainable livelihoods.

#### Tapping the Potential of Buddhist Nuns

Recipient: Tenzin Norgyal



Tenzin Norgyal is an educator and philosopher in India dedicated to bridging ancient Tibetan wisdom with modern educational needs. Since 2018,

Tenzin has taught English at Dolma Ling Nunnery, where he also engages in daily philosophy and debate with the nuns. Tenzin is driven by the belief that Buddhist nuns possess immense potential for leadership and community service that remains largely untapped.

Munpa Rabsel is an online education platform empowering Buddhist nuns to build professional skills in digital media, teaching methodology, and content production. The project provides training, equipment, and stipends to produce Tibetan language lessons, Buddhist teachings, and cultural content. Funding will help support building the organization's digital infrastructure and beginning operations.

## Ocean of Wisdom School

### Recipient: Ngawang Dolker



Ocean of Wisdom School (OWS) in Minneapolis, MN is a tuition-free public charter school. Opening in Fall

2026, OWS will serve K-4 students through a forward-thinking educational model that blends rigorous learning with Social, Emotional, and Ethical Learning (SEE Learning®), a globally recognized framework developed at Emory University in collaboration with His Holiness the Dalai Lama.

The school's approach helps students build resilience, ethical awareness, and a deep sense of connection- to themselves, to others, and to the world around them.

OWS is committed to creating a welcoming, inclusive school community where every child feels seen, valued, and supported. As part of that commitment, Tibetan language is offered as an optional program, reflecting the Twin Cities' vibrant Tibetan community - one of the largest in the nation - and addressing a meaningful gap in public education.

## The Schrucker Fellowship

Awardees for the Schrucker Fellowship were selected from a highly competitive pool of applications submitted by Tibetans. The seven selected projects reflect the diversity, creativity, and global reach of contemporary Tibetan artistic expression.

A requirement is that each project will be implemented during the 2026 calendar year. ICT thanks the Schroeder and Pucker families for their generous support and extends deep

appreciation to all the applicants for their efforts, creativity and dedication to making a contribution in this field.

The Schrucker Fellowship, managed by ICT, was inspired by a trip to Dharamsala in 2024 where family members were introduced to a burgeoning contemporary Tibetan arts and creative community in Dharamsala. The fellowship was established to nurture and support this community, providing Tibetan artists with the resources they need to continue their important work.

### Highlighting Some of This Year's Schrucker Fellowship Recipients

#### The Goldfish of Norbulingka

##### Recipient: Kunchok Rabten



Kunchok Rabten is a Tibetan short story writer, translator, and filmmaker based in Dharamsala, India. His notable translations include works such as *The Pearl* by John Steinbeck, *Why the Dalai Lama Matters*, *Stages of Meditation*, and *The Wisdom of Forgiveness*. He also wrote and self-published the children's series *The Adventures of Norbu* (2023) and translated *The Adventures of Pinocchio* (2021). *A Phone Call* is his debut short film.

The Schrucker Fellowship will support the development of the screenplay for *The Goldfish of Norbulingka*, a 20-30 minute 2D animated film inspired by Tibetan stories and culture.

#### Self-Portraits, Women-hood, Women in Power

##### Recipient: Ngoshi Choedon



Ngoshi Choedon is a self-taught paper collage artist, freelance illustrator, and Certified Expressive Arts Therapy Practitioner based in Dharamsala.

Using layered paper, she explores emotions, womanhood, and Tibetan identity. Inspired by traditional Tibetan dress and the Himalayan region, her work reflects ancestral memory, cultural wisdom, and a deep connection to heritage. The Schrucker Fellowship will help support the artist's new pieces exploring identity, relationships, womanhood, women in power, and how society views women.

#### Creating a New Theatrical Production: Phayul

##### Recipient: Lhakpa Tsering



Lhakpa Tsering is a Tibetan activist, playwright, and the Founding Director of Tibet Theatre, the first professional Tibetan theatre group

in exile. Born in 1983 in Tsona, Tibet, he escaped into exile in India in 1992. His life and work are deeply rooted in the Tibetan freedom struggle and the preservation of Tibetan identity under occupation.

Since founding Tibet Theatre in 2011, he has written 29 original Tibetan plays and led 340+ performances across India and internationally.

Phayul is a new theatre production by Tibet Theatre that explores how Tibet lost its independence in 1959, and the resistance that followed Chinese occupation. Fellowship funding will help support in-depth historical research and authentic storytelling, laying the groundwork for an international premiere in December 2026.

## CENTRAL TIBETAN ADMINISTRATION HOLDS FREE AND FAIR DEMOCRATIC ELECTIONS FOR SIKYONG AND TIBETAN PARLIAMENT IN EXILE

ICT congratulates the Central Tibetan Administration (CTA) and its Central Election Commission (CEC) on successfully holding democratic, free and fair primary elections on February 1. Utilizing one of the world's most innovative decentralized voting systems, the global Tibetan diaspora, including tens of thousands of Tibetans 18 years of age and older in more than 30 countries, exercised their fundamental right to determine their own future.

The Tibetan election is a two-stage process, with primary elections to nominate candidates followed by general elections to decide on the winner. Through this year's election, the Tibetan people are peacefully and democratically choosing the 45 members of the Tibetan Parliament-in-Exile and the political head or president of the CTA known as the Sikyong.

"ICT and all supporters of democracy and freedom around the world con-

gratulate the CTA and the Tibetan people on holding free, fair, and democratic elections to choose their political leaders. Tibet belongs to the Tibetan people, and they alone will determine its future," said ICT President Tencho Gyatso.

A total of 91,042 voters have registered for the 2026 election cycle; 56,749 from the Indian subcontinent, and 34,293 from rest of the world. The Tibetan Election Commission has announced that the official slogan for the 2025-26 Tibetan Elections will be "I AM TIBET, I VOTE FOR TIBET," signifying the unity and strength of the Tibetan people.

The final round of voting is scheduled for April 26. Results will be announced by the Tibetan Election Commission on May 13. Elected CTA leaders including the Sikyong and the Members of Parliament will serve five-year terms from May 2026 to May 2031.

**The Central Tibetan Administration in Dharamsala, India, is composed of three pillars:**

- **The judiciary** as represented by the Tibetan Supreme Justice Commission;
- **The legislature** as represented by the Tibetan Parliament in Exile (TPIE);
- **The executive** as represented by the Sikyong and his cabinet.

While the three Justice Commissioners are elected by the TPIE, the Sikyong and the 45 Members of the TPIE are freely, democratically and directly elected by Tibetans around the world outside of Tibet. Political authority has rested solely with the elected CTA leadership since 2011. The autonomous Central Election Commission (CEC) conducts the elections, including deciding and publishing the schedule and guidelines.



## A YEAR OF COMPASSION CONTINUES WITH SCREENINGS OF *WISDOM OF HAPPINESS*

The Year of Compassion, celebrating His Holiness' 90th birthday—from July 6, 2025 to July 6, 2026—continues with screenings of a powerful documentary showing a timeless truth: happiness is still possible, even in the midst of chaos and uncertainty. In *Wisdom of Happiness*, this message is delivered as a personal audience with one of the greatest living thinkers, Nobel Peace Prize winner Tenzin Gyatso, His Holiness the Dalai Lama.

With disarming clarity and deep humanity, His Holiness invites us to imagine—and help create—a world where compassion is activated as our strongest force for change, and happiness is within reach for everyone.

In October, ICT Board Chair Richard Gere, an Executive Producer of the film, along with ICT President Tencho Gyatso, Rep. Michael McCaul (R-TX) and Director of Tibet Center Khensur Nicky Vreeland held a screening at the Museum of the Moving Image in New York City.

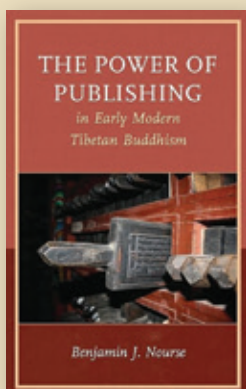

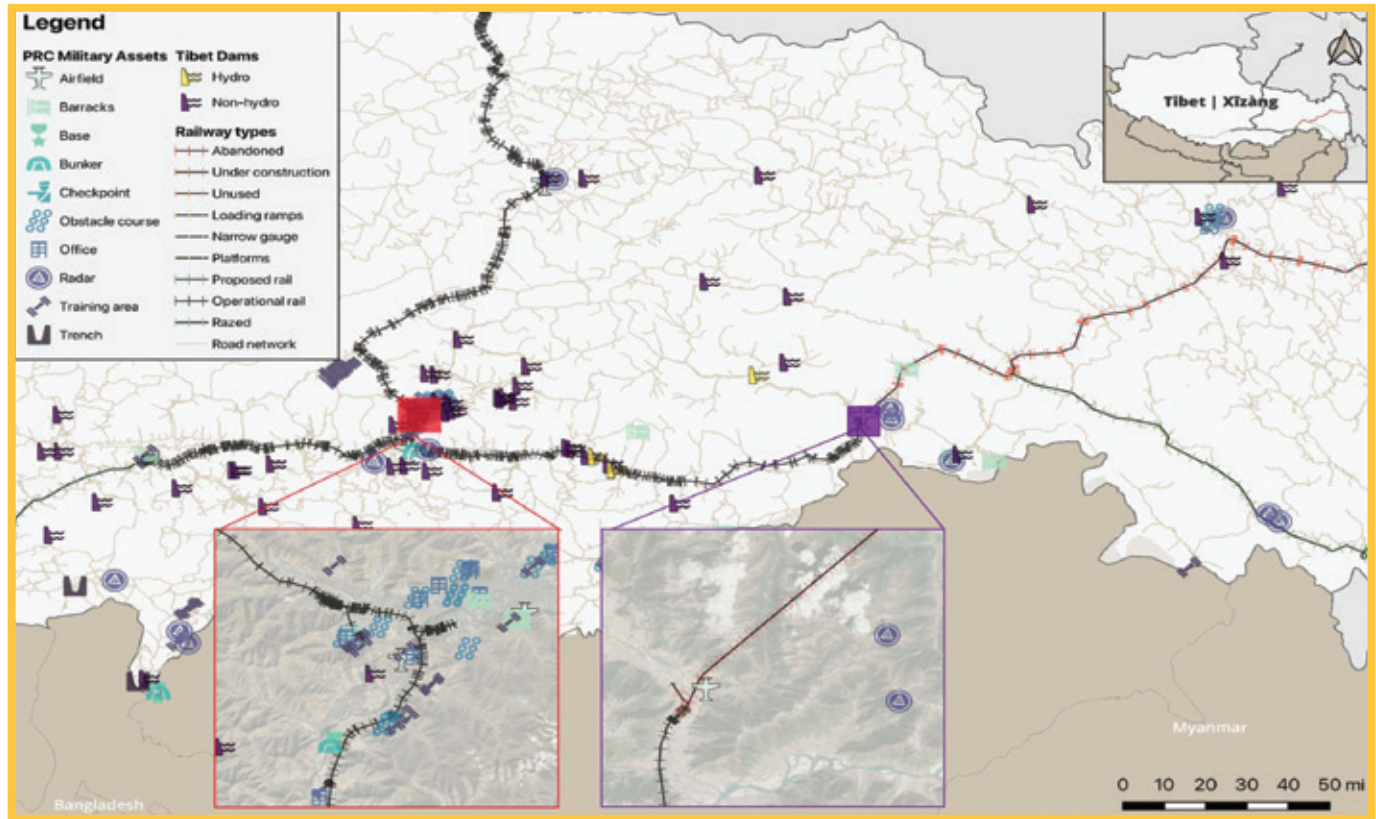
## THE POWER OF PUBLISHING IN EARLY MODERN TIBETAN BUDDHISM

# NEW ICT REPORT: WHY TIBET?

## STRATEGIC IMPERATIVES FOR INTERNATIONAL PEACE & SECURITY

As global geopolitical challenges deepen and security threats increase, this new report from ICT highlights Tibet’s strategic importance across geopolitical, economic, cultural, and military dimensions.

ICT urges policymakers in the US, Europe, Asia, and elsewhere to prioritize Tibet amid China’s growing challenge to international norms, which have buttressed global peace and security for decades. China’s expanding influence and disregard for international law and human rights threaten the freedoms of the Tibetan people. They also pose risks to geopolitical stability and environmental sustainability in the broader South Asia region.

China leverages Tibet’s location and exploits its vast economic resources precisely because of Beijing’s systematic repression of the Tibetan

people and its denial of their self-determination. **Elevating Tibet as a critical issue is both a moral obligation and a strategic imperative to uphold international peace and security.**

Tibet is prominently situated at the intersection of three nuclear-armed states: China, India, and Pakistan. This geographic location places it at the crossroads of security dynamics among major powers, with ramifications for international peace and stability, including the strategic roles and security strategies of the US, Europe and other countries in the region. Its unique positioning makes Tibet central to the broader advancement of international security.

Tibetan aspirations for self-determination, for human rights, and for the protection of their cultural identity are inherently connected to security and

stability in the region and beyond. They demonstrate, if realized through peaceful negotiations within the Dalai Lama’s Middle Way Approach, how Tibet could be a zone of peace, guaranteeing security, enhancing cooperation among nations, and ultimately providing prosperity for all peoples in the region.

## CALL TO ACTION: SUPPORT THE TIBETAN PEOPLE IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE!

As your constituent, I am glad to see the Senate’s leading role in supporting the human rights and democratic freedoms of the Tibetan people. The Resolve Tibet Act of 2024 passed through the Senate unanimously, and the Tibetan Policy and Support Act of 2020 and the Reciprocal Access to Tibet Act of 2018 both received overwhelming bipartisan support.

In March 2026 the Chinese government passed an “Ethnic Unity and Progress Law” which will now put even greater assimilationist pressure on Tibet’s unique cultural, religious, and linguistic heritage. In light of China’s continued repression in Tibet, we must do more.

I am calling for:

- Greater recognition of the Central Tibetan Administration as the legitimate democratic voice of Tibet;
- Continued support for the Tibetan people by urging the State Department to swiftly implement Congressionally-appropriated funds for Tibetans in Tibet, Tibetan refugees in South Asia, and the Central Tibetan Administration; and
- An unequivocal message from Congress in opposition to the Chinese Communist Party’s relentless human rights violations in Tibet
